I would not class the SSH as evil. I do think it has utility that is at least potentially more useful than not. But I also think people tend to simplify the SSH more than required, (as well as "complicate" it too) which probably makes it somewhat more of a further "mechanising" of humanity at a broad level, which is a general and unfortunate tendency people in general have when faced with any new technology as well as taxonomy that relates to people. Because, indeed, MPAL.

There is some evidence (quite a bit more difficult to present than the SSH, as it is far more subtle) that there is "some" validity to at least certain aspects of astrology. Every study I have seen supposedly "debunking it" was atrociously designed, yet I do not care enough one way or the other to either study it further, or design an experiment to investigate it better. Because even if I did and even if I managed to confirm my suspicions on it, invariably, humans would end up using it as some sort of label/club/limiting descriptor to state that "all cancers are weak pains in the ass" or that "Leos are truly the best people" and so on, in effect reducing any possible positive use one could make of it to a net negative when compared to the negative uses people would subject it to.

The "simplification" of the SSH by people other than Vox is unfortunately inevitable and a net negative, but that can hardly be blamed on Vox. He created or invented a tool. Which definitely has utility. How others use it is really out of his hands to a large degree.

As for your criticism that he designed the SSH purposely as a way to shut down his critics, I again, don't think so at all. I think he simply created the SSH as a way to classify, in general terms, various types of people. And as with any man, certain types of men are ones he likes less than others. I can relate in a number of ways:

1. I had developed my own taxonomy long before Vox publicly described his. I never made mine public in writing at the time, but friends of mine who I discussed it with could attest to this. My version was far less detailed than his as I only had Alphas (which maps to his Alphas pretty much one for one), Scouts (which maps to his Sigmas closely though not completely) and Betas which was purposely left as a far more generic "catchall" classification which in essence contains all the other classifications he came up with (Betas, Deltas, Omegas, Lambdas, Gammas). I was aware that in my classification Betas was a VAST range of men, but as my own way of classifying things was primarily concerned with noticing which type of men could be "dangerous" the details were irrelevant for my purposes, since when push came to shove, despite the differences and vast variety of Betas and thus their responses, none of them would be a threat (at least to me). Such a relatively narrow purpose would hardly be useful to others, and though it has infinitely more nuance than how I presented it here, as that was its main purpose, a publication of it would only have overall negative effects as it would be reduced to this rather limited overarching principle.
2. Had I made my classification public, I have no doubt most people would have tried to claim scout or alpha status while trying to either redefine, or further classify the Betas into categories that right or wrong would have been wholly irrelevant for my purposes. And undoubtedly some fantasists would have created entire categories to elevate themselves and excuse their flaws.
3. The IQ gap is a very real thing, and it sounds, looks, and probably feels generally "arrogant/elitist" to people that have that 30 point gap from the person higher up on the IQ ladder when the "mask" slips. Each man I have known with an IQ in the 150+ range has a more or less generic "go to" mechanism for dealing with the teeming masses of idiots we are surrounded by. Inevitably at times the mechanism fails regularly and our true frustration/contempt/irritation with the lower IQ crowd glimpses through, and can appear over-harsh, arrogant, unjust etc etc.

I have tried to explain this in terms of an analogy from a comic book I read in my teens that struck me very much at the time for how precisely it modelled my own general experience of other people. It featured quicksilver (one of the "evil" mutants that sided with Magneto against professor X and the X men) whose superpower is superspeed at (if I recall right) something even faster than The Flash (different universes as the Flash was DC and the mutants were Marvel comics) anyway he is arguing with his wife I think and the writing representing his speech goes from normal sized, to smaller and smaller to a mere line. The scene shows his wife going from upset to worried to kind of scared... as seen from Quicksilver's perspective (his name is Pietro by the way). He then realises his wife can't understand him anymore and it is here we find out that his superpower is ALWAYS ON. For him to have a normal conversation with literally EVERYONE around him he has to speak in what to him is slow motion. ALWAYS.

I know precisely what that feels like.

Almost everyone I know thinks I am an impatient man. I think the only person that understood how actually patient I am was my brother when he correctly explained to a group of people we were with that in reality my "impatience" was due to the fact that by the time everyone around me had understood step one of whatever was happening, I had seen steps one through ten and revised them twice and was patiently waiting for them to figure out step two when instead they were busy fucking up step seven out of sequence because they missed steps two through six.

When Vox calls out someone as a gamma, he's mostly right and even if not the confluence of reasons why he may decide that person X is not worth wasting any further time on, are probably several hundred reasons more than you can imagine.

No man is just one of the traits. We have most of the traits within us all of the time, but one will inevitably be more dominant than the others. The degree to which a man has the negative traits under control is the most important factor to consider personally in regards to this information. I have seen men who I would classify as predominately alpha suffer a personal setback and revert to insane gamma behaviour in an attempt to get even with those who betrayed him.

And the second point is that men can change. Men can rise from great personal adversity and overcome childhood trauma that may well have destroyed other men. It is often what you overcome that defines who you are as a man, and I agree with you that environment as a child has a great deal to do with this.
